Luang Pradit Phairoh (1881-1954) is widely regarded as the most influential musician of the 20th century. His career bridged the royal courts, to the end of the absolute monarchy, through the rebuilding of Bangkok following WW2 and the establishing of the national conservatory system for classical music and dance. **Supeena Insee Adler** (Ph.D., Music/Ethnomusicology, UCR) is a native Thai and Lao speaker and a Thai musician. She is a performer and ethnomusicologist living in San Diego. She performs and teaches classical Thai music on traditional stringed instruments and oversees communitybased Thai music classes at Wat Buddhajakramongkolratanaram, the Thai Buddhist temple in Escondido. Her other areas of interest are mediums, healing rituals and music in Northeast Thailand and Southern Laos, and Okinawan *minyo*.

Prof. Anant Narkkong earned his B.F.A. in Thai Music from Chulalongkorn University and an M.Phil in Ethnomusicology from SOAS, University of London. He founded the fusion music ensemble Korphai in 1983. He is not only a full-time faculty member at Silapakorn University but is an extraordinarily effective public sector ethnomusicologist and a wellknown public intellectual-artist in Thailand. He sustains three weekly radio shows as well as an active international profile as a specialist in Southeast Asian musics, promoting both traditional music sustainability as well as contemporary music developments.

The Korphai Ensemble ("Bamboo") is a top-ranked Thai classical music ensemble formed over thirty years ago, featuring two generations of outstanding musicians with court lineages. They have won awards for their recordings and film scores, including numerous Best Film Music and Score awards for *Homrong*. Their performances reflect the best of traditional styles as well as a contemporary spirit of experimentation based in traditional knowledge. Tonight they perform traditional repertoire for the *piphat* ensemble (xylophones, gong circles, drums, oboe, and cymbals).

The Korphai Ensemble is in Southern California on tour. They performed this week at several Thai Buddhist temples, and will be in residence at UCLA from March 9-12, culminating in an all-day free symposium and series of performances on Saturday, March 11 and a ritual to initiate California-based students of Thai music (*wai khruu*) on Sunday morning, March 12.
